


transforming tragedy

2006 at a glance

- 6,103 people volunteered, record numbers!
- 9 binational projects, 12 by the beginning of 2007
- \$643,210 was collected for the Amish School Recovery Fund
- 5,500 people became first-time donors to MDS
- 178 clean ups were accomplished
- 357 minor repairs
- 75 major repairs
- 31 houses were rebuilt
- 7 additional staff were added to facilitate growth and needs of MDS
- To better facilitate work in the Gulf, MDS purchased properties in project areas for the first time (Pass Christian, Mississippi and New Orleans, Louisiana)
- Triple increase of MDS vehicles to better serve projects
- Extension office in Winnipeg moved to a new location, an expansion of over 1,000 feet for added staff and support for higher numbers of volunteers

A message from the Executive Director



In 2006 we experienced ongoing tragedy and loss close to home and across the continent. MDS responded to flooding in Oregon and Washington, the October 15 earthquakes in Hawaii, and continued the immense work in the Gulf following the 2005 hurricanes. Volunteers were called to the summer and fall floodings in south central New York, and eager youth responded to community rebuilding in Cross Lake, Manitoba. We will not forget the moment we heard news of the Nickel Mines School shooting on October 2. Tragedy came to our doorsteps.

In the midst of these tragedies over 6,000 volunteers responded, willing to be the hands and feet of Jesus by rebuilding and restoring homes. They came from the east, west, north and south, eager to serve.

When asked why they came, most would say that it is their desire to demonstrate the love of Christ to those stricken by disasters. "All you need are wings—you gave me hope to start again," said one homeowner to a dozen young MDS volunteers dressed in white Tyvek® suits.

This year we also experienced growth and changes in our offices in Akron and Winnipeg. Seven new positions have been added to accommodate the two-fold increase in volunteers, three-fold increase in equipment purchases, and four-fold increase in projects.

With God's help MDS can continue to be a people's movement transforming tragedy into renewed hope. Thank you for your prayers and support. To God be the glory.

One homeowner's story

When Hurricane Rita swept through the town of Point Aux Chenes in southern Louisiana, Ann and Forest Billiot's trailer home was destroyed.

"Last year was a very difficult year for us," said Ann, a soft spoken Native American woman. "Our son was killed in a car accident, Hurricane Rita

happened and then Forest had a heart attack."

Since MDS opened its project in Point Aux Chenes in October 2005, it has partnered with several agencies to help in the rebuilding and restoration of the small town which is home to the Biloxi-Chitimachi Native American tribe. Partnerships between MDS, Shelter for Life International and Berean Baptist Church in Mansfield, Ohio and others led to the building of the Billiot's home.

Members of the Berean Baptist Church built the exterior and interior walls of the house designed by Shelter for Life and then disassembled them before shipping them to Point Aux Chenes in June. MDS volunteers assembled the house atop 12 foot wooden supports which will keep the house high enough to sustain storm surges. These Shelter for Life houses are designed to sustain a Category 5 storm with winds of up to 150 mph.

According to Steve Cheramie Risingsun, a Native American Mennonite Pastor, "MDS and Men-

nonite Central Committee (MCC) were the quickest to respond here to human need with compassion through material aid and rebuilding homes."

The bayou of Louisiana are affected by floods, tropical storms and hurricanes because of the lowering of coastlines. Homes like this and others being built by MDS are enabling Native peoples to maintain their culture as they wait for the coastlines to be repaired.

"The Lord said he's going to bless us and he did," says Ann Billiot standing in front of her new home. "I thank God for everyone who was involved with this. Those who couldn't build blessed us in prayer."




